Sirs:
I am respectfully submitting herewith the Annual Report of the Police Department for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1927.

As is now the custom the report consists almost entirely of statistical data and graphic representations of existing conditions compiled and prepared by the Division of Records and its Statistical Bureau. The efficient functioning of that division enables the members of the Department at any time to secure an excellent picture of existing problems and the equipment which is available for the solving of those problems.

The City of Los Angeles has found itself during the fiscal year just past confronted with the same limitations in manpower in its Police Department as has been noted in two previous reports. The authorized strength of the Department for the past year was 2491 members, a decrease of $1.77 \%$ over the previous year. Annexations during the year increased the area from 425.60 to 448 square miles, an increase of $5.3 \%$. The population, according to the most reliable estimates, has increased about 67,000 , or $5.5 \%$. The unfavorable comparison between Los Angeles and other large cities in the United States as to the number of policemen on duty per square mile continues.

It is very pleasant to report a great increase in efficiency along two specific lines which was rendered possible through the interest and co-operation of members of the Police Commission and the City Council. For the first time in the history of the Department, I believe, each division has its own ambulance service throughout the twenty-four hours of the day. During the latter part of the year a fine increase in motor equipment made it possible to have forty-seven pieces of automobile equipment operating from 4:00 P.M. to 8:00 A.M. daily as a motor patrol, manned by efficient crews watching for all kinds of violations but particularly for hold-ups and robbery cases in general. This service is proving invaluable.

During the year two new Division Headquarters buildings have been opened-one at Sawtelle and one at 1335 Georgia street. With the opening of the latter station a new Division known as Georgia Street Division was created. The boundaries of the new Division are Seventh street to Adams, Vermont to San Pedro. The territory
divides with Central the most important business portion of the city and serves also one of the most heavily populated residential sections.

Traffic control continues to be one of the major problems. According to figures recently issued by the Los Angeles Traffic Commission Los Angeles has more passenger automobiles than any other city with the single exception of New York. The same ratio of automobiles to inhabitants probably obtains in Los Angeles as prevails throughout the state, and in that California leads all other states, having one automobile to every 3.11 persons in the state. These facts explain the need for the assignment of an increasing number of officers to traffic duty. Additional automatic signals installed during the year have helped very materially. Nevertheless the statistical record this year will show an increase in traffic injuries over last year of $21 \%$. That this rising rate of injuries is in no way accompanied by lessening activity on the part of traffic officers is shown by the fact that the number of traffic arrests made and complaints issued this year shows an increase of $46.6 \%$ over last year's record.

Since it is generally recognized that better understanding of traffic regulations and a greater spirit of co-operation on the part of the public, both drivers and pedestrians, are essential to the prevention of accidents that result in injuries, this Department has continued and encouraged the growth and work of the Safety Bureau. This Bureau has utilized many avenues of approach to the public-the showing of safety films accompanied by lectures to adults and to children in the schools, radio programs consisting of entertainment features interspersed with traffic safety talks, and the supplying of short traffic safety items known as "Safety Pointers" to daily and weekly newspapers.

An outstanding accomplishment of the year has been the work done by the Narcotic Detail. Their campaign was carefully planned, and through the co-operation of the courts and other agencies in the city was carried out with telling effect. This detail reports that whereas in former days there were many addict repeaters in our jails there are at the present time practically none and that almost all of the known police problem addicts are no longer to be found in the city. Since it is recognized by all those thoroughly familiar with this problem that the police problem drug addict is in about $90 \%$ of the cases also a criminal in other lines the importance of this accomplishment can scarcely be overestimated. It is believed that the apparent elimination of large numbers of these known addicts from the city's population has contributed materially to the reduction in crimes against property which will be noted in the statistical data.

In the statistical tables dealing with crimes in general it will be noted that the increase in robberies reported is but $1.7 \%$. Inasmuch as the population increase is $5.6 \%$ this is in fact a decrease and not an increase in proportion to the problems involved. In the face of the increased population and increase in area to be protected the $6.8 \%$ decrease in burglaries and the $8.3 \%$ decrease in larcenies from the person are notable achievements.

It might be interesting to point out in this connection that the robbery rate per 100,000 population for this fiscal year is 108 as against 155 for the year 1924-25. The burglary rate this year is 630 per 100,000 as compared with 737 in 1924-25.

In the activities of those details which deal with vice there will be found a considerable increase. For violations of the Wright Act alone a $26.4 / \%$ increase over the previous year in number of arrests has been recorded. In a deterinined attempt to prevent as many crimes as possible, a policy of bringing in suspicious characters has been carried on for some time. Through the co-operation of the courts it has been possible to hold such characters on vagrancy charges, thus enabling the Identification Bureau to fingerprint them and identify them. As a result many criminals wanted on felony charges in other parts
of the country have been picked up here and returned, thus preventing them from preying on the citizens of Los Angeles.

I am exceedingly glad to be able to report for the Department a higher average of proficiency in shooting by monthly qualification ratings than can be shown by any other departments in cities comparable to Los Angeles. This proficiency is attracting wide attention. It means a body of men not only ready but properly qualified to defend the lives and property of citizens at any time and in any emergency.

It is a pleasure to be able to transmit this statement of conditions, problems and accomplishments of the past year on behalf of the Department. I wish to thank the meinbers of the Board of Police Commissioners for their genuine interest in the work of the Department and for their very generous expenditure of their time and energy in the work that has been carried on.

Sir:
The following report of the activities of the Board of Police Commissioners and the Police Department covering the fiscal year 1926-1927, is submitted to your Honor with considerable feeling of achievement on the part of the Board of Police Commissioners, in view of the limited facilities at hand, that is to say, lack of personnel, equipment and finances, in comparison with the territorial expansion of the municipal area.

Annexations to the City of Los Angeles made during the past two years have necessitated the establishment of new additional police substations. Suitable quarters had to be obtained for these substations and they had to be manned, in addition to furnishing necessary equipment for the same, which include general furnishings and transportation equipment, all of which had to be accomplished with little or no increased appropriations and without additional men, and very little additional equipment to that already in the department.

The Board of Police Commissioners desires to call Your Honor's attention to the Police Department Budget for 1927-1928. Before submitting budget estimate a careful survey was made of the entire department as to actual needs, and the budget presented consequent thereto was conservative in the extreme, in comparison with the anticipated needs of the department for the coming year.

As you are aware, the budget estimate was greatly reduced before it was approved. Such reduction leaves the Police Department in such a financial condition as to greatly hamper its efficiency from the standpoint of adequate personnel and equipment.

It has become necessary from time to time for the Police Department to petition the City Council for additional appropriations outside of the 1927-1928 budget allowance, to take care of the needs of the Police Department, and many times these appropriations are not forthcoming.

The citizens of Los Angeles are continually demanding greater efficiency from the Police Department, yet very few realize that for many years this department has been operating between $40 \%$ and $60 \%$ standard efficiency as to quantity equipment and personnel.

The Board of Police Commissioners is of the opinion that the City of Los Angeles has attained a position as one of the foremost cities of the world, and as such is entitled to $100 \%$ efficiency in these matters, in order to cope with the conditions which are constantly confronting them in law enforcement.

The Board of Police Commissioners desires to assure Your Honor that it will continue in its efforts to build up and maintain a police department that will be unequalled. This, however, can only be accomplished with the proper co-operation ketween all concerned, and much needed facilities.

## TRAFFIC SIGNALS—SIGNS

Commensurate with the growth of population and the increase of motor vehicles in the city has been the growth in traffic and the increase in traffic problems.

In spite of the installation of 80 new sets of signals in the past year, making a total of 131 intersections controlled by signal, the rapid growth of traffic at signalled corners and the appearance of new points of congestion has prevented a diminution of the number of men required to be assigned to traficic duties.

Some relief will be obtained with the installation of 160 further intersections, for which the contracts have been let on a quota basis of 10 per month.

With the installation of these signals, a great amount of time has been spent in the study of the various forms of synchronous control, from a remote central timing station in the case of the central business district and from local timing devices in the case of boulevards and other main arteries. It is our aim to evolve a timing and a sequence which will handle the greatest volume of motor and street traffic in the least time, not omitting consideration for the pedestrian who is also required to obey the signals.

The short time since the extensive installation does not permit any definite conclusions to date, though study and experiment continues.

The year has seen added to the work of the street painting sub-division 128 painted cross-walks, 139 permanent cross-walks, 279 commercial loading zones, 38 passenger loading zones (new provision), 1911 intersection buttons and 26,120 feet of red curbing.

In addition to new work, the maintenance of the markings already provided called for the painting of 17,198
loading zones (each repainting considered separately), 433,573 feet of red curbing, which, together with center lines, angle parking lines and accompanying lettering, consumed 11,686 gallons of paint.

Much of our painting is made necessary by those sections of the traffic ordinance which makes it as mandatory on the Police Commission to maintain proper signs and markings as it does the citizen to obey them.

That same spirit of fairness to the motorist pervades all of our traffic regulations and their enforcement, leading to a cheerful co-operation between police and public, without which the regulations would be valueless.

The great territory which must be covered by the available members of the Police Department has made it almost impossible to investigate accidents with a view to criminal action, except in those cases which resulted or were expected to result in death, with attendant homicide arrests. Of the less serious personal injury accidents, only those referred to the Accident Investigation Bureau, accompanied by a promise to follow through with prosecution regardless of civil damages, are thoroughly investigated by the department. This bureau received 1246 complaints, on which it filed 242 criminal actions and secured 204 convictions, losing 22 cases by acquittal.

In addition, 162 drivers were warned by the bureau but no criminal actions were filed against them.

In 948 cases insufficient evidence to support a criminal action was found and these cases were therefore filed without action.

More intensive work on individual accident cases is prevented by both the lack of department personnel and the difficulty of securing the co-operation of the victim after he has secured civil damages.

## PUBLIC SAFETY BUREAU

Feeling that it is only through education of present drivers and drivers-to-be, that our motor vehicle accident rate may be kept from rising faster than the rate with which additional automobiles are placed on our streets, the Los Angeles Police Department maintains a Traffic Safety Bureau of six men under a sergeant of police.

The work of this bureau has so increased in the last year and a half that it has been necessary to increase the bureau from one man, the sergeant, to its present personnel.

The activities of the bureau include lectures to parentteacher associations, school assemblies, fraternal organizations, clubs and industrial groups.

Through the courtesy of a motor car dealer of this city, we are fortunately equipped with a three-reel motion picture depicting vividly the inconveniences and dangers of incorrect and unlawful handling of motor vehicles. With it we use a two-reel motion picture showing the hazards of the work done by the Police and Fire Departments. We estimate that during the past year we have reached with the picture 165,000 people of all ages, all of whom are vitally affected by the problem either as drivers or pedestrians.

The cheerful co-operation of all of the radio stations in Los Angeles County permits us to broadcast daily reminders of the need for constant attention and consideration in the use of the public highways.

This bureau enjoys the use of a large amount of space in the daily and weekly papers and other periodicals published in and about Los Angeles, by means of which it is able to further keep accident prevention and safety in the mind of the public.

While of course, as in any effort of this kind, it is practically impossible to gauge the actual tangible results, the Bureau feels that it is accomplishing much in developing what we may call a public consciousness of the seriousness of the traffic situation and a public desire to remedy the matter, not through organized efforts but through the effort of each individual to do his part to make our improved rapid means of transportation a blessing to all who use it, and to prevent it being a menace to those not quite so fortunate.

## TRANSPORTATION

The supervision and care of the motor equipment of the Department is vested in a central transportation division, which operates a storage garage and a shop for repairs and general overhauling.

It is the policy of this division to seek to maintain both the mechanical condition and the appearance of the motor equipment on the highest possible plane so that they will not only be able to perform emergency police work safely but will bring the highest possible allowance when replacement becomes necessary.

During the year the policy of the Department with respect to motor equipment for traffic regulation was changed, causing a reduction in motorcycles, of which 50 were sold and the addition of 20 six-cylinder touring cars.

The tabulations below show the present motor equipment of the Department, the purchases during the past year, the operation cost per mile of the passenger cars and motorcycles and the work performed during the fiscal year:

The decrease in the number of arrests on State Poison and Drug Addiction charges is attributed to efficient work by the Police Department and the whole-hearted co-operation of the courts. The courts have taken the stand that drug addiction is one of the basic factors in crime and that the incarceration of individuals addicted to the use of narcotics has a tendency to lessen crime. The period
of incarceration gives the drug addict an opportunity to get the drug out of his system and to take the first steps in rehabilitation. In this connection it should be noted that many different so-called cures have been experimented with, among them the Narcosan treatnient. None have proved successful. To date incarceration witl absolute certainty that no drug is procurable has proved to be the only treatment that is of genuine value to the addict.

Drug peddlers in this city are given no consideration. In most cases it has proved possible to send them to the penitentiary.
The courts have held that a drug peddler is as dangerous as a man who might commit murder, and very little sympathy is given such peddlers. This fact has become well known throughout the Los Angeles underworld, and these individuals have decided to reside elsewhere, rather than take chances in our city.

One of the most successful drives on drug addicts ever launched by our Department took place during the month of May, 1926. During this time every available man was used to apprehend drug peddlers and addicts. This drive materially assisted our Department in the suppression of crime. During this short period 161 addicts and peddlers were arrested and convicted. At least 85 per cent of these, at the expiration of their sentences, left this city rather than risk further prosecution.

## JAILS DIVISION

The Jail Division consists of one receiving jail (Central), one confinement jail (Lincoln Heights), and sufficient jail facilities at the divisional stations to care for current arrests and a trusty janitor crew from the station. We care only for men prisoners in our jails, boarding all women prisoners with the County of Los Angeles at a flat rate of $\$ .80$ per prisoner day or portion thereof.

Aside from prisoners under investigation and awaiting trial, only trusty workmen are kept in the receiving jail, all the sentenced prisoners being confined in the Lincoln Heights Jail or divisional jails. Lincoln Heights Jail consists of units of cell blocks for prisoners whose nature or offenses make confinement necessary and dormitory units
for those admitted to the trusty status. It is from the Lincoln Heights dormitory units that labor gangs are loaned to the Park Commission and Board of Public Works for use in certain improvements for which no funds to pay day labor are available.

In calculating the cost of jail operations, the Central Receiving Jail is grouped with the minor divisional jails (unsentenced and minor labor prisoners) and the Lincoln Heights Jail considered apart (sentenced and major labor prisoners). Meals for the San Pedro, Wilmington and Venice trusties are bought from restaurants at $\$ .30$ per meal, and are in addition to the cost of maintenance included with Central Jail.

## RECORDS

The Records Division is the central clearing house and depository for all reports of crime and accidents, for identification records and for warrants turned over to the Police Department for service. From these individual reports are compiled daily, monthly and special reports showing the organization, problems and work of the Department, as well as analyses of crimes and criminals.

This division aids investigation by the maintenance, in addition to the usual identification and criminal records, of a corps of fingerprint, handwriting and chemical research experts whose services are invaluable to investigating officers confronted with crimes capable of solution only by recourse to their particular fields.

Our system operates for the early knowledge of the presence in our city of persons from other parts of the country who have previous criminal records by requiring the taking of fingerprints of all persons arrested in the city (except those on minor city ordinance violations), and a clearance from the Identification Bureau before release on bail is permitted.

As indication of the work of the Identification Bureau, it will be noted that a total of 68,379 prints were received, of which 38,602 were found to be already in our files and 29,777 (other than drunk or vagrant prints, searched but not filed) were added to our files, which now contain the prints of 144,960 persons.

The Latent Fingerprint Detail connected 61 persons with 101 crimes, 66 of these crimes being burglaries on
which no other evidence was had. Thirty-five dead bodies, many without other identification, were identified by this detail through the presence of previous arrest prints of the deceased in the files.

The Laboratory was able to operate to much better advantage this year, studying 107 cases of materials suspected of being poisonous or containing poison, 138 samples of liquor suspected of being poisonous and responsible for serious illness or death.

Sixteen bullets were studied for identification, 13 samples of hair and 19 samples of alleged blood stain were analysed and reported upon.

The Handwriting Detail handled 1300 specimens of handwriting, filing them for future reference. In addition to rendering an opinion on 520 specimens, for the benefit of investigating officers, the Handwriting Expert testified as such in 50 court cases, all of which were rewarded with conviction.

The Statistical Bureau, in connection with the collection and analysis of the material on organization, crimes and criminals presented in this annual report, operates a modus operandi system by the use of tabulating machines and cards which has proven of incalculable value to investigating officers in connecting criminals and cases where no other direct connection is apparent except the manner in which the crime was committed.

## MARKSMANSHIP

Each member of the Department is required to demonstrate his ability as a marksman by making a qualification score each month. This requirement is not based simply on marksmanship for marksmanship's sake, but upon a sincere belief that every policeman should know how to use and be able to use his weapon quickly and effectively. Such ability may at any time mean the difference between life and death for some citizen he is called upon to protect, for himself, when engaged in the protection of life or property, or even for the innocent bystander who might become an unintended victim.

In addition to the required shooting, the Department encourages participation in interdivisional, interdepartmental and other contests with skilled bank, post office and peace officer teams.

That this interest in marksmanship has not been withouts its reward in demonstrated efficiency is shown by the taking of first place in the spring contest of the National Rifle Association, with a high score of 1197 points of a possible 1250. The nearest contenders attained scores of 1165 and 1119 , respectively. This is the second time that a team from this Department has contested. Last year, just after its organization, the team won second place.

The monthly qualification is with .45 revolvers for uniformed men and any reliable arm they may desire to carry for plain-clothes men. The target is the U. S. Army 500 -yard rifle target with 8 -inch " 8 " ring. A score of 60 must be made with 10 shots slow fire-at will-and a score of 40 must be made at rapid fire- 10 seconds for each string of five shots. Opportunity to qualify is given on Department time, but in the event of failure, further trial must be on member's own time. Failure to qualify
in any given month is an offense against the regulations of the Department and is punishable as such.

In view of a change of regulations during the year, no comparison of scores is possible. The scores presented below are the average scores of the respective divisions for the month of June. In fairness to the other divisions it must be said that a small group of the best contest shots of the Department are included in Property Division, which includes the operation of the range.
